


### "JOURNEYING TOGETHER" - AN EDUCATIONAL PRINCIPLE FOR FORMATION

We are grateful to the six sub-group moderators (core team), support buddies (one-to-one study) and to certain professors who kept encouraging us to study and express ourselves well. This made the process of preparation for the comprehensive exams meaningful. Personally, I had an amazing experience of preparing a road map of theses through analysis and synthesis. In my analysis, in highlighting the unique bullet points, I was able to explore connections in every thesis with respect to the following themes:-



Andrew chose Alibaug, as our destination for the outing. Instead of the usual road travel we took the sea route, to Alibaug. Travelling by the Ro-Ro ferry was a wonderful experience. The scenic beauty was just spectacular and awesome. Upon reaching the Mandwa jetty, we took auto rickshaws to 'Mary of Nazareth Church' Alibaug, our place of stay for the entire trip. The next day we went to Korlai, where we visited the Religious sisters who run a boarding. Thereafter, we visited the Mount Carmel Church where Fr. Although it was exhausting, upon reaching the top we had a sense of satisfaction and enjoyed the experience. After lunch we went to see the Murud-Janjira fort. We then visited the Kashid beach, which was a stone's throw from there. On the third day we visited the 'Sagar ghat' village which is located on a hill. The Mount Carmel Parish supports



the families of this village by providing them ration and other necessities of life. The visit was more like a trek since all of us walked up to the top. Over there one of the social workers explained how the Church is contributing towards helping the families so as to improve their living conditions. We then conducted games for the children which they really enjoyed. We then had lunch and then made our way back. In the evening we went to the Carmelite Sisters' convent. They explained to us the work they do and also the challenges they face, as well as briefed us on the history of their Congregation. The next day we had to return back to the Seminary. It was indeed a wonderful experience as a group wherein we not only saw many different places but also bonded well as a group.



Presently, there are 100 catholic families, who continue to be witnesses of Jesus Christ amidst various challenges.

### **MISSION EXPERIENCE – BHALE**

Our much-awaited 'Mission Experience' was held in the month of October 2022, wherein we the propaedeutic students of St. Pius X Seminary went to Mangaon for our mission experience. During our initial days at Mangaon, we were based at the SVD centre, where Fr. Richard (SVD) had arranged for our comfortable stay. After spending a couple of days at the centre we were finally sent to our mission exposure station. Br. Brijesh and I were sent to Bhale in the Raigad district. Bhale was a much developed place as compared to the other villages around the place. The coordinator from the SVD center 'Sunita Tai' was our guide to the village. We were staying at the Anganwadi, a place for the local community students to study and do their day-to-day school activities. The village comprised of 33 families wherein the majority of the family members were farmers and a few were fishermen. Our stay at Bhale gave us an insight into the life and culture of the villagers.

The children of the village were studying in a Marathi medium school run by the panchayat community of the district. We also had the opportunity to witness the village monthly meeting at the Anganwadi, wherein they discuss their grievances and also share problems faced; owing to lack of essential facilities. The village Head as well as the members of the SVD community introduced us to the gathering. Our interaction with the kids and the elderly helped us reflect deeper and grow in our journey of the priestly formation. Becoming aware of the common problems faced by the villagers, we sensed a great humbling and a need





for simplicity in our life. We were taken around the village to visit the families and know their way of living. The villagers gladly welcomed us into their homes. We thank the Seminary for giving us this wonderful mission experience at Bhale.

### **MISSION EXPERIENCE 'YERAD'**

For our mission experience we were sent to the SVD centre headed by Fr. Richard Quadros, at Mangaon, Raigad which falls under the mission area of the Archdiocese of Bombay. The hamlet we were sent to was Yerad which is 18 km from Mangaon. We had a lot of fears in our minds before setting out for the village: would we get a proper place to stay and will basic necessities be available? Would we be able to adjust to the food? Will there be electricity and network coverage for mobiles? etc. However, trusting in God's providence we went out on our journey and the God of surprises was true to his nature! When we reached the hamlet we were surprised to see that all that we needed was available: a place to stay, food, electricity and all we needed. Most of all the couple in whose house we stayed gave us a warm welcome and treated us as one of their own family members. There were 70 to 75 families in the hamlet. Every morning we would spend our





time teaching the children songs and playing games. The villagers seemed happy and content with their work and family as we did not witness any domestic fights or drunken behaviour. When we conversed with the people of the village, we realised that there was a serious crisis of stable jobs and education of children, due to the migration of parents for taking up jobs in the brick making industry. The lack of education led to child marriages. The members of the SVD centre are working on this issue and hope to reduce the number of child marriage cases by imparting proper education. Protecting the forest and it's rich flora and fauna was one of their main concerns, for which lot of plans were already being executed. Also, one day we accompanied the people to fetch drinking water drawn out from a hand pump, from a distant place. This made us realize the value of drinking water which we get so freely in the city and waste. In spite of these and other problems, the people continued to be happy, cheerful and satisfied with what they had; which also became our take away and learning from this mission experience.

Our mission exposure stay was at Potner, a hamlet in Raigad district. We were sent as a group consisting of three members. It was a great experience for us to work as a team in the rural setting of the Katkari Tribes. The indistinct view of our neighbouring houses in the morning due to the dense fog, gave us a sense of being in the seventh heaven! The situation of the tribes living in a hamlet of 20 houses may have been less developed, but they all related to each other as one family, with an attitude of love and harmony. The children were satisfied with the minimal resources available to play and enjoyed the day. The main occupations of the community are cattle rearing, farming, and dredging of lakes and ponds. The greenery of nature was a charming sight. Every hour, the clanging of a train could be heard from the railway tracks, which were only a few yards





away from our house and this reminded us of the crowded Bombay local trains. The food that we were served was simple yet delectable. But what was paramount was the care and respect rendered to us by the tribes while we sat down to eat. It was stupendous. Overall, the sojourn was sweet and peaceful amidst a serene environment.

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
