From the Rector's Desk


Permit me to greet you very fondly on this occasion when St. Pius X College enters its Diamond Jubilee Year, having been inaugurated on 5th October 1960 at the hands of Gregory Peter Cardinal Agagianian, then Prefect of the Sacred Congregation of Propaganda Fide, in the presence of the late Valerian Cardinal Gracias, then Archbishop of Bombay. This is a proud moment indeed for all of us, since the Church in Mumbai looks upon its diocesan

seminary with great regard, affection, admiration and a sense of responsibility for its upkeep!

Our Patron, St Pius X, while being known as the "Pope of the Eucharist", is also remembered as an "antimodernist", in his honest attempts to help the church of his time come to terms with the challenges thrown up by the winds of the enlightenment; it would, we all know, be unfair to judge his efforts by using the yardsticks of today to tackle such crises. In the same vein, observing the upheavals that Pope Francis is creating in the world and in the church in the present era, it may be really unfair to dub him as an "ultra-modernist", as his critics would like to call him; and such critics are not in a minority!

In its diamond Jubilee year, the Seminary draws inspiration from both, St Pius X as well as Pope Francis. We have chosen to remain with our motto, sourced from St Pius X, "Instaurare Omnia in Christo" for all our renewal efforts! And we look to the guidance provided by Pope Francis, the "ultra-modern", or perhaps just the evangelically audacious Pastor of the universal Church, to cast our nets into the deep!

Pope Francis is known, characteristically, to have the 'smell of his sheep' and speak in a language that is simple and direct, touching the hearts of his sheep! But

that does not mean he is not profound rigorously sound. Massimo nor Borghesi, author of a book entitled The Mind of Pope Francis: Jorge Mario Bergoglio's Intellectual Journey, (Collegeville, Minnesota, 2017), helps us appreciate the background to the Pope's profound thinking. He says on pg. xix-xx,: "Bergoglio's language... is 'simple' because he wants it simple. It is simplicity that is rooted in long reflection and in evangelical simplicity, not in any limitation of expression. Behind it lies a rich and original

thought process, derived from the Jesuit school and nourished not only by Argentine teachers but also, and above all, by European ones. When young Bergoglio was a student of philosophy and theology at Colegio Maximo in San Miguel, his standard references were the Jesuit intellectuals of the French sphere: Henri de Lubac, Gaston Fessard, Michel de Certeau. Some were representatives of the French school. These are his teachers." We realize that the Holy Spirit was preparing Jorge Mario Bergoglio SJ for the chair of Peter not only through the myriad pastoral assignments he had, but also through an exposure to a broad spectrum of intellectual influences!

As we pay attention to restoring all things in Christ during this Diamond Jubilee Year, it will be our effort to ensure that in our seminary our students too are well grounded in the intellectual influences that will help them understand the tremendous changes taking place in contemporary society, forge new models of evangelisation, and critically evaluate them, in order to continue to be relevant to today's fast-changing pastoral situations. We count on the grace of the Holy Spirit, specially his gifts of wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord, to help all our students grow into effective "missionary disciples" in the modern world!

The Holy Spirit descended on the apostles and set them on a mission. Similarly, we at the seminary invoke the Holy Spirit, at the start of every academic year, to guide and influence us. This year Cardinal Oswald Gracias celebrated the Mass of the Holy Spirit for the community of St Pius X Seminary on 8thJuly, 2019. He prayed in a special way for the staff and students. He also expressed how important the seminary is to him and how he reserves this day every year to visit the seminary community.

At the Lectio Brevis the Cardinal spoke about his close interactions with the Pope, as one of his six consultors. The pope, he said, is gearing the churches to focus on spreading the Gospel of Christ. He also spoke of the "Francis Effect" the Pope's great emphasis on mercy and compassion. He wants the church to be an inclusive church, and a missionary church. Even we priests and bishops must go to the "peripheries". We in our dioceses need to empower our Laity so that they become "missionary disciples" (quoting from Evangelii Gaudium). Cardinal Gracias stressed that we must acknowledge and encourage the contribution of women and listen to and communicate with the youth in our ministry.

Being a former President of the Asian Bishops' Conference, the Cardinal told us that the November 2020 plenary assembly will draw up a pastoral plan for Asia, which he is eagerly looking forward to. He then shifted his focus to India and his ongoing dialogue with the government of India, specifically with the Prime Minister's office.



Closer to home, 2019-20 marks the Diamond Jubilee Year of St. Pius X Seminary. The Cardinal congratulated the community and expressed his excitement and vision for the seminary in the course of this year. He made a special mention of Cardinal Valerian Gracias who is chiefly responsible for the seminary building and complex that we call home today. Concluding on this positive and hopeful note, he then took a few questions from the house and answered all of them patiently.

As this year unfolds, we are propelled by the grace of God and the blessings of our Shepherd.

SEVEN NEW "NOTES" TO CREATE A NEW MELODY FOR THE LORD



Do Re Mi Fa Sol La Si are the seven basic notes that make a melody when combined in harmony. The 'orchestra' of St Pius X College, Goregaon was delighted to welcome seven new "notes" (candidates) to create a new melody for the Lord, on Sunday, 16th June 2019. The staff and students of the seminary warmly welcomed these seven energetic men; three for the Archdiocese of Bombay, one each for the Dioceses of Baroda, Belgaum, Mysore, and Poona.

As they are embarking on a journey of priestly formation it was fitting that they commence this journey seeking the blessings of God. These seven candidates along with their parents and family members took part in an inspiring prayer service organized for them in the same Chapel on the second floor, where the candidates will spend a considerable amount of time in prayer and reflection during the Propaedeutic Year. As these candidates took their first steps towards the altar, Fr Prashant Padu, the moderator of the propaedeutic year, introduced the candidates to all. The opening prayer expressed sentiments of gratitude to God as well as sought his blessings on these candidates whom he has called to become "missionary disciples". A reading from the Gospel according to John narrating the call of the first disciples made the candidates conscious of Jesus' call to "Come and See" (John 1:39). Then followed the intercessions and the Lord's Prayer, after which, Fr. Aniceto Pereira, the Rector of the Seminary led the concluding prayer. The Rector then directed the attention of the candidates onto the painting of Jesus calling his disciples by the sea and encouraged them to contemplate their own call each and every time they looked



at the painting. Lastly, the candidates were invited to feel at home as the Rector gave them a Fatherly hug and as a gesture of welcome offered a copy of the document on priestly formation, "The Gift of the Priestly Vocation" and a Bible Diary to each of them.

These seven candidates have now begun their initial formation to the

priesthood with the Propaedeutic stage. The Gift of the Priestly Vocation is a document on priestly formation, which describes this stage as "a period of time of preparation of an introductory nature, in view of the priestly formation to follow" and also "a real time of vocational discernment, undertaken within community life."

Let us call upon the Blessed Trinity and seek the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary that these seven unique and diverse "notes" may create a delightful melody for the Lord and truly become "Ambassadors for Christ." (2 Cor 5:20).




FAREWELL TO FR. JEROME D'SOUZA SJ.




Fr. Caesar rejoins the seminary staff after many years. He will be serving as a Spiritual Director.


Fr. Shailendra Rodrigues IMS
