The Pongal festival, a vibrant celebration of harvest, was joyfully observed by the St. Pius X community on January 16th. The day began with a Tamil Holy Eucharist, accompanied by beautiful hymns in Indian classical music. Fr. S.M. Michael SVD, the main celebrant, provided insights into the significance of Pongal during the homily, emphasizing its role as a festival of gratitude for the bountiful harvest. The refectory, adorned with mango leaves and banana plants, became a center of cultural activity, hosting a traditional vegetarian feast and a mesmerizing 'Karaghatum' dance performance by the brothers. The Rector's heartfelt wishes added a personal touch to the festivities, concluding a day where people from diverse backgrounds came together to experience warmth and joy. St. Pius X College truly embodied the essence of Pongal – a celebration of unity, gratitude, and cultural diversity.



The seminarians of St. Pius X College participated in group recollections on 17th and 18th January 2024 as part of their academic and human formation. Following a group sharing session and dinner, the community Rosary was prayed, followed by a session on Fraternal Correction by Fr. John Baretto. The day concluded with a community mass at 12 pm, followed by lunch. The brothers also had the opportunity to visit the Sequeira Brothers Sculpture manufacturing workshop, where they met Mr. Benzoni, the owner, who provided them with a tour and demonstrated the process of creating sculptures. To end the day, they visited Br. Lawrence D'souza's family in Vasai before returning with a sense of enthusiasm and camaraderie from the group recollection.



The Water Boys II group recollection was led by Fr. Jerry, CSSR, at Vinayalaya. Our session began with introspective questions such as "Who am I?" and "What is my net worth?" As philosophers, we were encouraged to respond with "I am a conscious being in the world" to the question of our identity. This reflection allowed us to contemplate our personal values and vocational purpose. During the recollection, Fr. Jerry guided us to uncover the underlying factors that hindered our deep connection with God. Through meaningful adoration, we confronted and overcame the obstacles in our spiritual growth. Additionally, we cherished moments of prayer, silent contemplation of His words, and meaningful confessions, all of which strengthened our bond with God.


